



In November of 2020, Trey Holleway was elected as Constable for Precinct 2 of Washington County, Texas. On January 01, 2021, he took the oath of office and began serving as your Constable. As your Constable, Trey has fulfilled his Constitutional Responsibilities by performing Bailiff Duties for his Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Court and serving and executing all civil processes issued by the Precinct Judge. He also serves and executes civil processes originating from County Courts and District Courts both within Washington County and from outside the county to include other states.

In addition to serving his Precinct Justice of the Peace, and in order to maintain the continuity of government for the people, Trey also assists with covering the Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace court proceedings as a Bailiff and assists with serving civil processes originating out of that court along with helping the newly appointed Constable.

The office of Constable is considered the "peoples' police" because of their Constitutional origin and local elected representation of the people. In addition to his Constitutional Duties, Trey provides security for Commissioners Court Proceedings and Election Security. He also enforces Court Orders, serves warrants, and assists with tax seizure sales of real property. He engages in enforcing traffic laws, he conducts criminal investigations, and he's involved in community event planning and security.

Trey believes that interagency collaboration is the best mechanism to keep a community safe by pooling assets, resources, and personnel. Although he is the only officer for the Precinct 2 Constable's Office, he has continued his collaborative efforts by being involved with the following:
